Victorian Speed Boat Club 70th Anniversary

The Victorian Speed Boat Club held its 70th birthday anniversary on a Saturday early in September. The event was held at the club's grounds at Lake Eppalock. To help with the celebrations, the CAWPBA put 10 boats on display to commemorate the club's as well as race boat history.

Many of the boats on show were ex VSBC boats which had raced with the club at some time. These were *Stormy* and *The JET* in the late 1950's, *Electric Girl* and *So Long II* in the early 1960's and *Aquaholic*, which raced as *Gemini* in the late 1960's. The skiffs *Scrubcat, Invader* and *Pagan* and runabout *B.Pee*, while not previous members of the VSBC, represented other race boats of 50's and 60's. Having said that, *Invader* is now a current VSBC member boat.

Other woodies on display were *All-Torque* and *The Eagle*. *All-Torque* is a 13' Fiat powered Simpkin skiff, owned by VSBC Commodore, Greg Holland. *The Eagle* is a 15' Everingham powered by a rearmount 253 Holden and owned by Tom Heffernan.

It was a really good day. The weather was mild and sunny and the lake was glassy in the morning and rippled up slightly in the afternoon. Few boats took to the water, with *Pagan* and *Invader* being the only woodies to venture out.

It was good to catch up with each other again after the winter break from activities.

As is always the case with these events, new info was gained on a couple of the boats. Doug got a bit of background on *Electric Girl* and its original owner from a previous club member that knew both the boat and the owner from their race days.

Michael also got talking to someone who knew about the history of his boat *Aquaholic* when it was set up with twin Fiat motors and was raced as *Gemini*.

Some excellent food was available all day and that continued into the evening for a few of us who

stayed on for the celebratory dinner. These were Michael Nealer, Ross Foster, Alan Price, Bob Carter and yours truly.

The clubrooms, which had been decorated up with many pictures of boats and events over

the club's history, was packed with party goers - a really good turnout. Some entertaining speeches were made, which also included recognition and a thank-you to the CAWPBA for putting on the boat display.



There was also an interesting auction held for a "one off" framed mirror that had been engraved to commemorate the club's 70th anniversary. The proceeds from the sale would go towards the running of the next Griffith Cup. Bidding began at a price and rate one would have expected before becoming a little more spirited with the bids



climbing considerably. The winning bid came in at \$4,500, with the new owner, in a very club-minded spirit, offering the mirror back, to be kept and permanently displayed in the club rooms.

A call to the RACV saw a flatbed tow truck despatched and retrieval of the wheel was executed while waiting for the truck.

The trailer and boat were delivered to Bacchus Marsh for repairs in time for its display at the VSBC.

It seems that the stub axle had sheared off. Gladly, there was no damage to the boat and only some minor damage to the trailer, which included some ground down U-bolts and fishplates.

NARRANDERA 2018



Well, there's another Narrandera done and dusted. That's quite a few times now that I've said that.

Numbers were a bit down this year, with just 12 boats on the lake. A couple of late withdrawals didn't help the numbers nor their very disappointed owners. Nathan couldn't get his Glen-L Thunderbolt painted due to the paint not arriving in time and metal in *Rhonda Babe II's* oil filter put paid to its attendance this year

Boats that did make it this year were B.Pee, Butter Box, Electric Girl, HL219S Hydro, La' altra Donna, Leanne, Ronda, Scrubcat, So Long II, Stormy, Torque Wood and Turbo-Fire.

Stormy and Electric Girl both began badly with starting issues, but both were quickly resolved when their respective faulty battery isolators were "isolated". Regarding Stormy, it never ceases to amaze me how a boat will start so easily on the trailer but the moment it is in the water and pushed away from the bank, it decides to be cranky. At least Electric Girl was cranky on the trailer.

Other casualties for the weekend were *Leanne* with carby issues, *B.Pee* with an annoying miss (that developed), and *Scrubcat* with some unwanted water amongst all the mechanical stuff.

New boats for the weekend were Tony Marks' beautiful 20' self built Glen-L Monaco classic runabout, *La' altra Donna*. Tony spent about seven years building the boat, completing it last year, and has done a truly superb job. The boat is simply immaculate and the attention to detail outstanding. *La' altra Donna's* 350 Chev PCM engine moved things along very nicely and sounded delightful in the process. You may even have seen the boat before—it was featured recently in a series of print advertisements for Peter Jackson Menswear.

Another new appearance was Torque-Wood, Andy and Mitch Griffiths

17' Trahacraft bondwood runabout. Looking very similar to a Syndicate hull, *Torque-Wood* was one of only a few of these hulls that were built in country Victoria. With not a lot of time to prepare the boat for Narrandera, Andy and Mitch seemed to have done enough to it to get it running really nicely over the full weekend, with the 265 ci Hemi engine performing strongly.

Also new to Lake Talbot was Graham Stevens Toyota powered Molinari hydro. Graham gave the boat a run on Sunday and the performance for a stock 1.6 litre was really something. The boat was very quick, indeed.

Ray Russell's *Ronda* was also a new face at Narrandera this year. Ray acquired the Lewis runabout late last year, it being in very good original condition after being stored for about 20 years. Carol was rapt—she could actually ride in a boat with Ray this year, instead of watching him circulate in that anti-social single seater of his.

Although *B.Pee* is not new to Narrandera, having attended before as *Resurrected*, it was its first appearance since its restoration and renaming by new owner Ken Lemin. *B.Pee* was its original (race) name. Resplendent in its new red livery, it was certainly a change from the previous yellow and blue hull colours.

With the lake open to the public as well this year, we still managed a great weekend with only a couple of "public" boats sharing the lake with us. Weather was a bit blowy on Friday, but remained warm and very boating friendly for the weekend, with none of the storms that we normally have to endure happening.

Friday night saw most of us head into town for a meal at the Charles Sturt Hotel. We certainly had the longest table in the pub that night.

Saturday was a great day on the water, with the temperature down


